Walter liked the fact that she gave us all torches!










# Pancake Day


### Young Voices Public Speaking Competition auditions



**Congratulations to the 88 children who achieved 100% attendance for March.** Mrs Lawrence is negotiating an extra break to celebrate this achievement.


**This year's whole school attendance to date is 94.31%.** This is slightly below our target of **96%** and we will continue to work with our families to achieve this.
